

OVER IN CAMDEN.

* After thirteen issues the *Camden Daily Democrat* has suspended publication.

* Burglars ransacked the Tabernacle M. E. Church and stole a silver communion cup.

* The new Central Democratic Association has passed resolutions indorsing Grover Cleveland.

* Thomas O'Rourke, "King of the Swamp Angels," was jailed yesterday, for brutally beating his aged parents, who support him in idleness.

* For an unprovoked assault on Nicholas E. Geist, a cripple, "Small" Mahoney, a notorious character, was locked up in the city hall last night.

* John Ewing, of Seventh and Spruce, was knocked down by a railroad train at Seventh and Chestnut, yesterday afternoon, and was injured about the head.

* Joseph Pink, the young paresis victim who tried to commit suicide, was released from the City Hall, yesterday, and his brother-in-law started with him for Toronto, Canada.

* Christopher Tenner, an ex-policeman, and Martin Sharp, a well-known local politician, had a fist fight on the street late Friday night, in which Tenner was worsted, but no arrests were made.

* The bodies of the suicide who jumped into Cooper's creek, and afterwards died in the hospital, and the man found in Newton creek, were buried in the Potters' Field yesterday. Neither one was identified.

* A motion to amend the record in the case of "Count" William Koochejay, sentenced to five years for bigamy, was made in the Criminal Court yesterday. The case will be carried to the Court of Errors and Appeals.

* While ex-Judge Hagg was endeavoring to get a writ of habeas corpus yesterday in the case of Henry Beckett, in order to test the legal right of Mayor Wescott to commit prisoners, Beckett was acquitted in the Criminal Court. The Democratic lawyers are now skirmishing for another case to make an issue on.
