

# CAMDEN ACCIDENT SUITS ARE SETTLED

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## Railroad Pays Man \$8000 for Injuries to Self and Death of Boy

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## Woman Dies Suddenly. James B. Goff Succumbs to Intestinal Trouble

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After nearly all the evidence had been presented to the jury, the suit of William Bauman against the West Jersey and Seashore Railroad for injuries to himself and the death of his six-year-old son, Albert, was settled in the Camden Circuit Court yesterday. It was understood that the settlement was for approximately \$8000. The accident occurred at Gloucester May 31, when a train struck a bicycle on which the father and son were riding.

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Trial in the suit of Louis Gonzales, of 1152 Collings avenue, for the death of his son, Louis, Jr., against Mrs. Florence C. Marple, of Fairview opened today. Mrs. Marple denied she was driving the car at high speed and says the boy was playing in the street and ran in the path of the car.

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After his machine was in collision with an express truck, George Schaefer, 32 years old, of 1402 Dauphin street, Philadelphia, was arrested on a charge of operating a car without a license. He was fined \$5.

Bordi Egidio, 24 years old, of 1723 Van Buren street, was injured about the legs, when his bicycle was hit by a machine driven by William Mayhew. The injured man was treated at Cooper Hospital. Mayhew reported the accident to the police.

Nine-year-old George Cleary, of 832 Line street, sustained lacerations of the back and legs, when struck by an auto driven by Howard Hubbs, of Palmyra.

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After causing the arrest of her husband, David Batchelor, alleging he fired five shots at her at the family home, Mrs. Blanche Batchelor, 26 years old, of 1108 Cooper street, declined to prosecute him in Police Court yesterday. Batchelor was given his freedom.

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Stricken with heart trouble while alone in her home, 926 South Ninth street, Mrs. Rose Jauroski, 58 years old, was found dead in a chair at a window, by her daughter, Mollie, on her return from work. Coroner Holl viewed the body and gave a certificate of death.

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James B. Goff, a widely-known resident of Camden, died in Balnbridge Hospital, Philadelphia, where he underwent an operation two weeks ago, for intestinal trouble. He was 37 years old, and was an executive in the United Knitting Company of Philadelphia. He was a son of Ephraim Goff, and a brother of Lawyer David Goff. He lived at 223 South Sixth street, where his wife and two daughters survive him. He was a member of Camden Lodge of Masons.

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
