

# TWENTY-TWO INJURED, 2 PROBABLY FATALLY, IN CAMDEN CAR WRECK

Body of Trolley Car Leaps From Trucks Throwing  
Passengers Through Windows—Majority of Vic-  
tims Are Philadelphians—Automobilists Carry  
Wounded to Cooper Hospital

Twenty-two persons were injured, two of them probably fatally, when a street car on the Pensauken line was wrecked in Camden, at 8 o'clock last night. The accident happened at Forty-seventh street and Maple avenue as the car was bound for the Federal street terminal. The majority of the injured were Philadelphians.

According to the motorman, Percy Williams, 37 years old, of 688 Woodland avenue, Camden, who, himself, received internal injuries, he was running at a moderate rate of speed when he came to the turn at Forty-seventh street and Maple avenue. Suddenly, he said, the lights on the car went out and the body of the car jumped from the trucks and toppled to the side of the tracks.

The passengers were thrown from their seats and many were cut by flying glass. The more seriously injured, whose in-

There was no warning for the passengers in the car and none had a chance to leap before the accident took place. Because of the darkness relatives were separated and it was some time before the persons attracted to the scene were certain there had been no deaths.
