RECRUITING "DRIVE" IN CAMDEN CHURCHES

National Guardsmen Visit Three
Edifices, Seeking New Members.
Wescott Chides Slackers

In an effort to arouse something like enthusiasm among the young men of Camden, recruiting sergeants of the Third Regiment, N. G. N. J., were stationed at several of the churches yesterday. In the morning they were at the First Baptist Church and at night at the First Presbyterian Church. Others spent the day at St. John's P. E. Church. The sergeants had application cards which were distributed among the men, several of whom expressed their intention of joining.

Every effort is being made to infuse something akin to war time enthusiasm in the young men of the city, but the recruiting has been very slow, both for the Guardsmen and the regular army service. At the big rally held in the Third Regiment Armory, Saturday afternoon, Attorney General John W. Wescott chided the young men, who he declared, would apparently sooner have a good time than respond to their country's call.

Major Harry G. Kramer, who is trying to get together enough men to compose an engineering corps, has obtained the names of about eighty from Camden county. As soon as he has a sufficient number he will organize them. His campaign has been the most energetic of any and yet he has experienced the greatest difficulty in getting responses to his appeals.
