* Mrs. Frank S. Helsler, of 453 Pearl street, was burned about the arms by gasoline.

* The investigation of Camden's municipal affairs will not be resumed until the recovery of Expert George Black, who is seriously ill.

* Engineer David R. Williams, of Atlantic City, who was prostrated by the heat last Friday, was able to leave the Cooper Hospital yesterday.

* The Sixth Ward Republican Club has elected City Clerk Varney, Deputy Sheriff Sell, William D. Brown, E. E. Jeffers and John Brothers as delegates to the State League of Republican Clubs.

* William Bond, of Philadelphia, has just discovered that his father died suddenly in Camden last January and was buried in Potter's Field. He has asked County Physician Jones for aid in having the body disinterred.
