

TWO DEATHS FROM HEAT REPORTED IN CAMDEN

Death of Man Weighing 300 Pounds Aggravated by Heat. Girl Stricken While at Work

Two deaths from the heat were reported in Camden yesterday. John Jackson, of 1113 Liberty street, who weighed over 300 pounds, died shortly after being admitted to Cooper Hospital. He was so heavy that it required extra help to carry him into the receiving ward. A weak heart is thought to have contributed to his death. The other victim was Moneola Dorsey, 2 months old, of 532 Liberty street, who died at her home.

Mrs. Rose Delama, 19 years old, of 810 Beckett street, was overcome by the heat while working in a cigar factory. She was taken to Cooper Hospital.

President for Six Terms

The Camden Board of Recreation Commissioners has re-elected Professor Frederick A. Finkeldey as president for the sixth consecutive year. Since his incumbency the playground system of Camden has been developed until it is second to none in any city its size. The present season is meeting with much success, as is indicated by the report of the supervisor, who says the indications are that the total attendance on the fifteen play centres will aggregate at least 175,000 children. Arrangements are under way for the annual festival to be held at Forest Hill Park during the latter part of next month.

Negroes Commend Action

Representative negroes of Camden county have commended the action of Common Pleas Court Judge Kates and Prosecutor Kraft for the swift and severe sentences meted out lately to negroes who have been terrorizing the communities by hold-ups. Deploring the acts of these members of the race, who hail in every instance from the South, J. Ryland Fortune, a school principal, and Rev. W. H. Boone, pastor of the Mt. Olivet Baptist Church, Haddonfield, in a letter state that they hope others who have failed to imbibe the true principles of morality, citizenship and Christianity, will at least take a lesson from "those unfortunate wretches who have gone before, and profit by their mistakes."

Finds Daughter at Ardmore

After a several months' search for his daughter, Margaret, 17 years old, Phillip Delguerra, of 124 Market street, Camden, located the girl and Lino Bataloni, of 613 North Front street, at Ardmore. Both were placed under arrest, and waiving their extradition rights, were taken before Justice Schmitz, who committed them to jail in default of bail on a misdemeanor charge.

Hold Patriotic Rally

Under the direction of the Religious Work Committee of the Camden Y. M. C. A., a patriotic rally was held last night from the steps of the City Hall on Haddon avenue. The fact that nearly 1000 Guardsmen have recently left the city for Sea Girt lent peculiar and impressive significance to last night's occasion. There was spirited singing of patriotic songs, the address being made by Rev. Charles I. Fitzgeorge, pastor of the Union M. E. Church. The meeting was presided over by C. C. Read, chairman of the committee.

Brennan Woman Jailed

Refusing to say anything about the case, Jennie Brennan, 25 years old, of 325 Mickle street, who stabbed Ceman Harding, 24 years old, of 267 Mechanic street, was yesterday committed to jail without bail by Recorder Stackhouse. The young woman's face brightened when Detective Brothers reported that the man whom she had stabbed because of his alleged attack on her, was in an improved condition at Cooper Hospital and will very likely recover.
