

## CAMDENITE LOSES LIFE ON TORPEDOED SHIP

### C. F. Daniels Drowned When Atlantic Sun Went Down. Brother Is Saved

Thought to have escaped from the Atlantic Sun when that craft was torpedoed by a Hun sub on March 31, Charles F. Daniels, 27 years old, of 428 North Eighth street, according to word received by his family from Washington yesterday, was drowned. He leaves a young widow and infant child.

With his brother, George, 21 years old, the ill-fated young man tried in vain to get into the regular service, but they were unable because of physical disabilities. Then they proceeded to go into the merchant marine, both signing up on the Atlantic Sun, George as a mess boy, and Charles as cook. They left home February 14 and expected to return in May. What makes the fatality more than sad is the fact that the wife of Charles had been informed of his being saved.

On the same boat was William Swenson, 19 years old, of 110 North Eighth street, who is reported as having been saved.

#### Postpone Receivership.

Vice Chancellor Learning, in Camden, has adjourned for a month the appointment of a receiver for the Seashore Gas Company and the prospects appear to be sufficient to warrant the belief it may not be necessary to take this drastic action. It was stated the city is obtaining the necessary fuel and the consumers are coming up with the \$2 rate recently fixed by the Public Utility Commission. With the advent of the summer cottagers the consumers will be materially increased so that the income will likely be sufficient to pay a little on the investment.

#### Century Old Records Evidence

Records dating back to the 20's of the last century figured yesterday in connection with the ejectment suit of Edward S. L. Moore against Preloder John Thomas before Circuit Court Judge Lloyd in Camden. The two purchased adjoining farms on what was originally the extensive agricultural holdings of the late Abraham Browning. Moore said Thomas has encroached on the plaintiff's line to the extent of taking up about three acres in its entirety. Thomas alleged he was on his own boundary. Both are men of means. A verdict for the defendant was given.

#### Plan Liberty Loan Parade

Plans are being perfected for the big Parade in Camden on Saturday night, April 6, for the opening of the Third Liberty Loan campaign. Yesterday Chairman James Scott stated he had been given assurance the various fraternities of the city will give evidence of their patriotism by turning out in full force. For the first time in the history of Free Masonry in New Jersey the Knights Templar will participate in this public demonstration. It was stated it is not unlikely that there will be a division of the Knights in full uniform with a band. Cyrene Commandery will probably have as its guests Helena Commandery of Burlington, Palestine Commandery of Trenton, Ivanhoe Commandery of Bordentown, Olivet Commandery of Millville and Atlantic City Commandery of Atlantic City.

#### Small Fire Is Spectacular

In a spectacular fire at the Standard Oil filling station at Fifteenth and Federal streets, Camden, yesterday, Lieutenant Horace Cairns climbed to the top of a blazing tank and sprayed the flames with a chemical. He was at times hidden by the fire and smoke and on several occasions it was thought he had fallen into the flames. But he kept to his post and prevented what would have been a very serious and devastating conflagration. The fire is supposed to have been caused by spontaneous combustion.
