

STILL PROBING SUNDAY LIQUOR SELLING CASES

Rumors That Grand Jury May Ignore Complaints Turned Down
by Previous Grand Jury

The grand jury of Camden county heard additional witnesses of the Law and Order League yesterday on complaints against Sunday liquor sellers. The witnesses in the case of Rev. C. B. Fisher, who claims he was assaulted at Gloucester City on Sunday, were also heard.

It was rumored about the court house that the cases of the forty-eight saloon-keepers which were ignored by the former grand jury would also be ignored by the present body, because the members do not want to cast a slight on the previous grand jury. The rumor, however, is believed to be without foundation, owing to Justice Garrison's charge on the point.

Constable Frederick Voight went to Gloucester City last evening with warrants for James Augenbach and John Cole, charged by Rev. Fisher with abuse and attempted assault. Augenbach and Cole each appeared before Justice Schmitz in Camden and furnished \$500 bail for their appearance in court. Voight also served a warrant on William Riley, at Berlin, charged with selling liquor illegally. Riley furnished bail to Justice Schmitz. A warrant has been issued for Charles Young upon a like charge. Young is the manager and treasurer of the Trout Run Club, near Berlin.

Lawyer Gibbons, of the Law and Order League, at the request of the grand jury, gave that body a general review of his work. He detailed the crusade, and stated his instructions as received at the beginning from Mayor Hatch and Prosecutor Jenkins, the latter since deceased. He was questioned upon his bill for detective work in the liquor cases, which the Board of Freeholders has so far refused to pay. Several of the jurymen expressed themselves of the opinion that the bill should be paid.
