Work of the Excise Commissioners—An Aged Druggists' Death.

Irving W. Harman, of 127 and 129 Kaighn avenue, who was recently convicted of selling liquor on Sunday, sent a communication to the Camden Board of Excise Commissioners last night, asking them to refund the \$50 fine. It was referred to the City Solicitor. The following transfers were made: Hugh Lavery, Fifth and Walnut streets, to John Saddler; Mary Sonders, 1113 Broadway, to Francis Sonders; John McCormick, from 213 Market street to 216 Market street.

The license of Michael Morris, at Broadway and Spruce streets, was refused. Christian Eckert was granted a license to sell at the Camden Lidertafel on the 19th.

The wagon factory of Henry Shultz, at Twelfth and Federal streets, was broken into and \$150 of material stolen.

A. W. Test, one of the pioneers in the drug business in Camden, died yesterday afternoon from typhoid fever. He was 67 years old, and for many years was in business at Second and Federal streets.

A fire broke out early yesterday morning in the city clerk's office. It started from a defective flue. The fireman, to get at the fire, had to tear away part of the wall. The damage will amount to about \$250.

James J. Verdin through his attorney, ex-Judge Wescott, has commenced suit against the Gloucester Manufacturing Company for \$20,000 damages, for injuries received while in the company's employ.

Andrew Ross, of Gloucester, charged with receiving goods from ex-Freeholder Patrick McNulty under false pretenses, was committed to jail in default of \$300 by Squire McAdams yesterday.
