

CAMDEN'S CONVENTIONS

Republicans Nominate Candidates for Three Offices.

The Republicans of Camden county yesterday launched their ticket in the field for the coming election. The nominations were as follows: County Clerk, Robert L. Barber; Register of

Deeds, Jacob Sickler; Coroner, Dr. A. H. Lippincott. All the candidates were chosen unanimously.

The County Clerk's convention was held at the City Hall. William D. Brown was elected permanent chairman and William B. Doyle secretary. Robert L. Barber was nominated for a second term by acclamation, as there was no opposition.

The Register of Deeds' convention was held in the town hall at Merchantville. Edward Delacroix was elected permanent chairman and William A. Husted secretary. There was but one name presented and Jacob Sickler received a renomination by acclamation.

At the Coroner's convention, which

was held at the Court House, Lawyer Charles Ira Wooster wanted the delegates to nominate a candidate for County Judge, but the chairman promptly sat down on any such movement in view of the decision of the Supreme Court knocking out the elective judiciary act. James McCormick was made permanent chairman of the convention and James Haney secretary. The names of Dr. A. H. Lippincott, Dr. William B. Christine and Charles N. Robinson, colored, were presented for the nomination for Coroner. Dr. Lippincott received 56 votes and Robinson got the balance, 13 votes. Before the result could be announced a letter was presented from Robinson withdrawing

his name. The nomination of Dr. Lippincott was then made unanimous.

Dr. A. H. Lippincott is a young man but 28 years old. He entered Jefferson Medical College in 1889. Three years later he secured his diploma as a physician and began practice in Camden.
