

NEW JERSEY NOTES

MERCHANTVILLE, N. J., Sept. 21.—There is no candidate on any of the party tickets for Mayor of Merchantville, but Volney Bennett will probably be nominated by citizens writing to his name. Mayor McAllister declined to run again.

MOORESTOWN.—William W. Stokes has presented a service flag to the Moorestown M. E. Church, bearing the figures 19.

MAPLE SHADE.—Henry Underwood for the second time fractured his arm while cranking his automobile in his garage at Maple Shade.

MERCHANTVILLE.—The Merchantville Water Company has served notice on the borough of Merchantville and township of Pensauken that an application will be made to the Public Utility Commission to increase the price of street plugs from \$25 to \$45 a year.

HADDONFIELD.—Former Assemblyman and Prosecutor Henry S. Scovel has suffered a relapse and is in a serious condition.

LENOLA.—Thomas Davis, while standing in front of his home on Fellowship road, was struck by an automobile and his scalp badly torn.

PENSAUKEN.—Thousands of baskets of tomatoes are going to waste on the farms in this vicinity because of a lack of pickers, and the commission men in Philadelphia have advised farmers that they can hope for not over 5 cents a basket, so flooded are the markets with tomatoes.
